# 1. Activities and Accomplishments

Eight department chairs, including both ROTC programs were in their first year starting with the fall 2018 semester. This is the largest single year turnover of chairs for AddRan College. As would be expected a considerable amount of time has been spent in one-on-one conversations and in chairs meetings. It should be noted that the new appointments impacted both of the Ph.D. granting programs. A number of the new

chairs found themselves leading searches and negotiating with candidates for the first time, in addition to preparing budget requests, faculty annual evaluations, and deciding merit raises.

- Dr. Carrie Currier, the 2017 AddRan Administrative Fellow completed her report on best management practices for the interdisciplinary minors programs. The focus was on marketing and recruitment activity planning and administrative practices.
- Dean Schoolmaster was a participant on the Lead On Goal 3 Committee dealing with Campus Culture.
- Dr. Dawn Elliott, the AddRan College Diversity Advocate, completed a revision of the best practices hiring manual, which has subsequently become the model adopted by other TCU academic units. She also brought to completion the final draft of the AddRan College Diversity Statement.
- On February 5, 2018, under the leadership of Associate Dean Peter Worthing, AddRan College held its first Research Spotlight lunch to highlight faculty research and creative activity.
- AddRan College served as a co-sponsor for a visit to TCU by Christo Brand, the jailer for Nelson Mandela.
- Dr. Hanan Hammad delivered the 11<sup>th</sup> AddRan Distinguished Faculty Lecture on March 8, 2018. The title of the talk was, "Sexual Politics in Contemporary Egypt: A Century of Women's Harassment in Public Urban Spaces."
- Mr. Denis McDonough, former Chief of Staff for President Obama, delivered the Robert
   D. Alexander Lecture in the Liberal Arts on March 22, 2018. The title of his talk was, "The Liberal Arts in the Age of Artificial Intelligence."
- During the spring 2018, we began the process of redesigning and repurposing the Language Lab, Scharbauer Hall 3004. The anticipated completion is projected for 1/9/2019 with the facility being renamed the Center for Languages and Culture.
- The Department of Religion conducted its program review with outside consultants on April 22, 2018. Dean Schoolmaster also met with religion faculty on contemplative studies.
- Dr. Charlotte Hogg from the Department of English held another successful Writing Boot Camp for faculty the week following May, 2018 graduation.
- The Office of the Dean held the two AddRan Hooding ceremonies on May 11, 2018 and December 14, 2018.

- During the summer of 2018 Dean Schoolmaster was appointed to the Sadler Hall Repurposing Committee. The committee was charged with the task of making planning recommendations to convert Sadler Hall from an administrative to a largely academic building.
- The Comparative Race and Ethnic Studies (CRES) program became a department and moved to the newly created School of Interdisciplinary Studies. Moving with them were the interdisciplinary studies minors in African-American Africana Studies and Latina(o) Studies.
- The Master of Liberal Arts (MLA) program under the leadership of Dr. Darren Middleton of the Department of Religion moved its administrative home to the AddRan College of Liberal Arts.
- Dr. LeAnna Schooley assumed the directorship of the Center for Texas Studies.
- Justin Botros was selected as the new IT Coordinator for AddRan College in August 2018.
- AddRan College co-sponsored the Native American and Indigenous Peoples Symposium in October, 2018. Drs. Theresa Gaul (English) and Scott Langston (Religion) organized the symposium.
- AddRan College was a co-sponsor of the World Affairs Council event featuring historian Michael Beschloss. The event was held at Ridglea Country Club on October 26, 2018.
- Dean Schoolmaster attended the Applied Geography Conference at Kent State University from October 31-November 2, 2018.
- Dr. Anne Frey organized the Frankenstein Forum on November 8-9, 2018. This forum was a follow-up to her AddRan Distinguished Faculty Lecture that was presented in March, 2017.
- One of the most important undertakings of 2018 was the revision of the 2023 Whitepaper and drafting of the Dean's Office strategic plan Vision in Action: Lead On. The new strategic plan will align the College with the four goals of the third iteration of TCU strategic plan Vision in Action. Working with Dean Schoolmaster and Associate Dean Peter Worthing was a small subgroup of department chairs and program directors including Dr. Darren Middleton, Dr. Carrie Currier, Dr. Joddy Murray, and Dr. Bill Meier. The draft version will be finalized during the spring 2019 semester.
- Three social events were held for department chairs and program directors.

## 2. AddRan College Development Efforts and Accomplishments

- One of the primary objectives for spring 2018 was to reenergize the Board of Visitors (BOV). Under the direction on Kathy Fletcher and Sam Kyei, the new chair of the BOV we added 16 new members. Of the 16, 6 were African-American giving us much needed diversity to the BOV.
- On March 22, 2018 Denis McDonough, the former Chief of Staff for former President Barack Obama, delivered the 4<sup>th</sup> Robert D. Alexander Lecture in the Liberal Arts. The title of the presentation was, "The Liberal Arts in the Age of Artificial Intelligence." More than 600 people attended the lecture in the BLUU ballroom. The Alexander Lecture, along with the Back-to-Class event, are the two major public events sponsored by AddRan College.
- During March, 2018 a small ad hoc committee began planning the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Excellence in Literary Fiction (ELF) Scholarship sponsored by Sandra and Michael Brown. The dinner and 10 year reunion of past recipients was held on September 17, 2018 at Minor House and hosted by Chancellor Boschini.
- Planning began for the 5<sup>th</sup> Back-to-Class event which will be held in March, 2019.
   Planning meetings were held over the spring and fall semesters.
- During November the BOV Executive Committee reviewed faculty proposals for presentation at the 5<sup>th</sup> Back-to-Class event to be held on March 28, 2019.
- The Spring 2018 meeting of the BOV was held on April 26. The meeting took place in the Debate Chamber in Scharbauer Hall.
- On July 12, 2018 a meet and greet event for BOV members was held at Acres Distillery in Downtown Fort Worth.
- The fall meeting of the Board of Visitors was held in the Debate Chamber on October 18, 2018. The individual subcommittee chairs made reports on identifying prospective new members for the BOV and on planning a spring dinner to be held at the headquarters of the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railroad.

Table 1 presents a summary of giving to AddRan College from 2014-2018. The 2018 total raised was the lowest reported. Central to the decline in the annual total was the decline in the size of the average gift to \$261. In addition, the average gift amount for small gifts dropped from 2017 to 2018. Kathy Fletcher the AddRan College Development Officer has spent considerable time recruiting new members to the Board of Visitors. She also reported, which is not reflected in the 2018 total, was that there are outstanding pledges of \$2.8 million. If this point is taken into account then much cultivation progress has been made in the development and fundraising area and will be realized during future years.

# 3. Statistical Overview of SCH, Majors, Degrees Conferred

 Undergraduate SCH (Table 2) increased by 1,181 from 2017 to 2018 for a total of 76,189. Since 2014 there has been an increase of 4,521 SCH or 6 percent. All of the departments in AddRan College had increased SCH production between 2017 and 2018 with the exception of Economics, Political Science, and Spanish and Hispanic Studies which had minor decreases.

- AddRan College continues to account for approximately 30% of all undergraduate SCH at TCU. The Department of English generates the most hours, 16,603, which is more than any other department at TCU.
- Graduate semester credit hours in the Departments of History and English (Table 3)
  were stable. The online Masters in Criminal Justice has grown from 261 in 2015 to 468 in
  2018 for a 79% increase. This program is progressing as anticipated and has become a
  revenue generator for TCU, AddRan College, and the Department of Criminal Justice.
  The administrative move of the MLA to AddRan College accounts for most of the
  graduate hours increase.

• The number of students majoring in AddRan College departments is at the highest in the 5-year reporting period summarized in Table 4. Between 2014 and 2018 the number of majors increased by 112 or 9 percent. Political Science and Economics have the largest number of majors with 383 and 328 respectively, which accounts for 51 percent of all AddRan majors. Criminal Justice, English, Sociology and Anthropology, and History account for another 36 percent of students majoring in AddRan College.

The total number of degrees conferred (Table 5) increased from 2017 to 2018. The
number of bachelors degrees increased by 24 to 383, and the number of masters
degrees increased by 27, largely attributed to the growth of the online degree in
Criminal Justice and the move of the MLA degree to AddRan College. The Departments
of History and English produced 13 Ph.D. degrees, which was the most for any single
year in the 5-year reporting period.

### 4. Research and Creative Activity and Accomplishments

• AddRan College funds six internal programs to support research and faculty development. The Administrative Fellowship Program is intended to develop administrative abilities and potential among faculty. Each fellow is tasked with a project that will help develop their administrative skill set while at the same time addressing a policy/process need within the college. The Fellow appointment which began during the fall 2018 semester was to Dr. Johnny Nhan from the Department of Criminal Justice. His project focused on assessing the job market skills and assistance provided to liberal arts majors upon graduation. Other Administrative Fellows include:

The total awarded for the AddRan Internal Research Support Programs was \$59,000. This is a \$10,000 increase over the total awarded in 2017. In 2018, 14 faculty received an award, as compared to 2017 when 10 faculty benefitted from the internal programs.

 2018 also marked the beginning of the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) designed to support student research. Administered by Associate Dean Peter Worthing the students and faculty mentors included:

Each of these student awards was for \$4,000 which included stipends for the students and faculty mentors, and operating support for the projects. The total support for the SURF program was \$20,000.

In addition to the AddRan College Awards, TCU offers other research and creative
activity support programs available to faculty from across the university. These awards
include the Instructional Development Grant (IDG), the Junior Faculty Summer Research
Program (JFSRP), and the Research and Creative Activity Fund (RCAF). AddRan Faculty
receiving TCU awards are summarized in Table 7.

Table 9 summarizes the scholarly and creative activity of AddRan faculty in 2018. During
the year faculty in all departments were successfully engaged in research, publications,
and creative activity. AddRan faculty published 15 books, 92 refereed articles, 63
chapters, 60 other publications, and presented at 278 regional, national, and
international meetings. Based on these scholarly accomplishments and productivity it is
clear that AddRan faculty are indeed working to raise the academic profile and
reputation of TCU as per the Vision in Action: Lead On agenda.

- Another example of AddRan's commitment to scholarship is the annual writing boot camp organized by Dr. Charlotte Hogg of the Department of English. Held the week following graduation in May, the boot camp provides a structured environment for faculty to pursue writing projects. In 2018, the 6<sup>th</sup> edition of the camp attracted 20 participants from all ranks of faculty. The Dean's Office provides a modest \$1,500 to purchase snacks and lunches for the faculty writers.
- Undergraduate research participation and support is evidenced by the Student
  Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) and the Undergraduate Festival of Research
  and Creative Activity co-directed by Drs. David Sandell and Keith Whitworth from the
  Department of Sociology and Anthropology. In 2018 the festival was held on April 12
  and 13. The presentations include regular conference format talks, creative writing and
  poetry readings, and poster presentations. For 2018, the number of presentations
  increased to 62 and 7 poster presentations were included in the festival (Table 10).

- Another method to assess research and creative activity is through the Professional Development Review (PDR) process. In 2018, 10 faculty were evaluated as part of the PDR process and all received satisfactory evaluations.
- Based upon the information presented in Tables 9 and 10 the PDR process, and the
  writing boot camp we believe the AddRan goal of encouraging and supporting research
  and creative activity is being met.

## 5. Progress on 2018 Goals for AddRan College

- Develop a program to better support and encourage undergraduate research. Achieved
  - Dr. Worthing implemented the Student Undergraduate Research Fellowship program which attracted 5 student participants and their faculty mentors.
- Review and where appropriate revise the internal AddRan College program for professional development, research, and creative activity. Achieved
  - One program was revised to specifically support interdisciplinary research –
     Interdisciplinary Teaching or Research Grant Program.
- Improve marketing and communication materials for use by the Office of Admissions and to help with the recruitment of AddRan College majors. **Achieved** 
  - Under the direction of Taylor Schwarz two pocket folders were designed to hold information on AddRan majors and minors.

- Repopulate the AddRan College Board of Visitors and select new officers for that group.

  - Sixteen new members including six African-Americans were added to the BOV. Mr.
     Sam Kyei was selected as the chair of the BOV.
- Plan and implement a successful Robert D. Alexander Lecture in the Liberal Arts.
   Achieved
  - Mr. Denis McDonough delivered the lecture on March 22, 2018 to an audience of over 600 people. The title of the talk was, "The Liberal Arts in the Age of Artificial Intelligence."
- Successfully complete searches to hire a new chair for the Department of Modern Languages Studies and Executive Director of the Center for Texas Studies. Achieved
  - Dr. LeAnna Schooley was selected as the Executive Director of the Center for Texas Studies and Dr. Muriel Cormican was hired as the chair of the Modern Languages Studies department.
- Integrate the work of Dr. Dawn Elliott as the AddRan College Faculty Diversity Advocate into faculty hiring and planning for diversity, equity, and inclusiveness. **Achieved** 
  - During the fall 2018 semester, 7 searches for hiring full-time faculty were started. Dr. Elliott participated in each search which results in hiring 6 new faculty including an African-American woman, Dr. Carmen Kynard, to fill the Radford chair in English. One search in history failed to result in a hire. Dr. Elliott also fully revised the best hiring practice manual originally developed by Dr. Max Krochmal.
- Update AddRan College Strategic Plan to conform to the VIA: Lead On four goal format.
   Achieved
  - A working group comprised of Dean Schoolmaster, Associate Deans Michael Butler and Peter Worthing, and faculty members Carrie Currier, Darren Middleton, William Meier, and Joddy Murray completed the final draft of the strategic plan in December, 2018.

#### 6. Goals for AddRan College 2019

- Conducted a successful 5<sup>th</sup> edition of the Back-to-Class event.
- Begin the implementation of the AddRan College of Liberal Arts Vision in Action: Lead On Strategic Plan.
- Dr. Schoolmaster will engage in succession planning in preparation for his stepping down as Dean on May 29, 2020.
- A search for a new Dean of AddRan College will begin during the fall 2019 semester.
- Continue to repopulate the AddRan Board of Visitors.
- Update the AddRan College Development Plan as part of the start of the public phase of the Capital Campaign during the fall 2019 semester.
- Reduce reliance on contingent faculty for course coverage.

 Explore the possibility of developing a Center for Student Success in Scharbauer Hall in the space that will be vacated when the Honors College moves to a repurposed Sadler Hall.

# 7. Challenges for AddRan College

• The use of contingent faculty to cover sections remains a problem. While new full-time faculty lines have been added the size of the incoming first-year class presents problems, especially in English, in other departments offering classes in the TCU Core Curriculum and in popular majors such as Criminal Justice and Economics. The use of contingent faculty to cover sections by subject discipline and department is presented in Table 11. The primary users of contingent faculty are the Departments of Criminal Justice, Economics, English, History, Sociology and Political Science. Across the college contingent faculty were used to cover 193 classes.

- Office space for faculty continues to be a problem often resulting in multiple lecturers, especially in English, having to share offices. The office space for graduate students in Reed Hall is also inadequate. We hope there will be some relief when the Honors College moves to Sadler Hall in 2021. Classroom space is also a challenge, especially in Reed Hall where the furniture is outdated and not conducive to the flexibility required for modern pedagogue.
- Upgrading the AddRan College website continues to be a slow process and operationally problematic.
- The single largest continuing challenge and threat to AddRan College comes from the perception that a degree in the liberal arts has lost value relative to a degree from a professional school, such as business, education, or nursing and the associated emphasis on vocationalism in undergraduate higher education. In part, this perception can be attributed to the economic recession of the last decade, as well as misguided and misinformed individuals in the media and politics who do not appreciate the importance and relevance of the liberal arts in contemporary society. This negative perception can hurt enrollment, affect the allocation of resources internal to TCU, and hinder fundraising efforts with external constituencies. Departments in the humanities and especially foreign languages, English and history continue to feel these lingering effects impacting the number of students deciding to major in these subjects. I believe that we have been successful in addressing these downward trends and that the future of the liberal arts at TCU remains bright.
